RRI Pillars and Components

① ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ Access to Asylum

- 1.1 Asylum seekers are not arbitrarily turned away at the border
- 1.2 Recipient countries' laws, statutes, and policies do not impede the right to seek asylum
- 1.3 Asylum seekers are provided sufficient material and legal assistance at the border
- 1.4 There are additional safe and legal routes to claim refugee status and asylum

② ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ Recognition as Refugees

- 2.1 National legal framework supports appropriate interpretation of the refugee definition(s)
- 2.2 Institutional framework allows for fair refugee status determination (RSD) and the granting of asylum
- 2.3 There are adequate rights and conditions for those pending status determination or the granting of asylum

③ ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ Refugees Enjoy their Rights

- 3.1 There are no instances of refoulement of recognized refugees
- 3.2 Refugees enjoy civil and political rights in the host country
- 3.3 Refugees enjoy cultural, economic and social rights in the host country
- 3.4 Policies facilitate social inclusion of refugees and prevent violence

④ ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ Refugees Become Self-Sufficient

- 4.1 Policies contribute to an enabling environment for refugees to achieve self-reliance
- 4.2 Efforts provide adequate living conditions and self-reliance for refugees that take host communities into account
- 4.3 Conditions enable local authorities, non-governmental and private sector actors to be involved in the refugee response

⑤ ■ ■ ■ ■ ■ Making the International Refugee System Work

- 5.1 There is adequate financing for the international refugee crisis response system
- 5.2 There is adequate contribution to financing the humanitarian system
- 5.3 There is global, regional and bilateral cooperation towards improved refugee responses
- 5.4 There is adequate international monitoring of countries' response to refugees

- 6.1 Local integration becomes a durable solution
- 6.2 Countries undertake resettlement
- 6.3 Repatriation is not premature and reintegration in the country of origin is supported
